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
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A Message from the President

The 2022-2023 year proved to be one of transition and learning for the Elmira College community. While the pandemic has finally ended, these continue to be challenging times for colleges and universities. A decline in the number of traditional college-age students, increasing skepticism among parents and students about the value of a college degree, and the impact of online education have all contributed some uncertainty to the current higher education landscape.





This shift hearkens back to Elmira College's founding when the institution pioneered a course of study for women that was equal in rigor to the best men's colleges. The ability to innovate has defined Elmira College throughout its 168-year history and is why we view the present challenges facing higher education as an opportunity to transform EC in order to serve a new generation of students. Several new opportunities, including a one-of-its-kind six-year accelerated BS to DO program, were introduced this past year and are highlighted in the pages that follow.

The College received approval of its five-year financial plan from the State Charities Bureau and is finalizing its five-year strategic plan, which was affirmed by the Board of Trustees this past June. Thank you to those who participated in the surveys and focus groups this past winter. Your feedback provided important input about the College and its future. Major themes from the draft strategic plan include:

- Ensuring strong enrollment
- Strengthening the College's financial position
- Increasing philanthropic support to the College
- Improving institutional sustainability and effectiveness
- Supporting faculty and student research, creative work, and knowledge generation
- Increasing the diversity of faculty, staff, and student populations
- Providing resources to support mental and physical well-being amongst students and employees

NEW ACADEMIC PROGRAMS ADD ACADEMIC EXPERTISE, **CAREER FOCUS**

As Elmira College continues its strategic initiatives to bring a liberal arts education together with professional programs, several new academic programs launched in 2022-2023.

Data Analytics Minor: Designed to pair well with other academic majors, the Data Analytics minor builds the problem-solving, mathematical modeling, computer programming, and statistics skills necessary to analyze and visualize data effectively. These are high-demand skills that can apply to nearly every profession. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, data scientist roles are expected to grow by 36% between 2021-2031.

Forensic Science Minor: This program is for students who are passionate about science, analytics, and methodology. It adds to the Chemistry, Biochemistry, Biology, Clinical Lab Science, and Environmental Science programs, providing students with a professional pathway to an exciting and high-demand career. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, between 2021-2031, Forensic Lab Technician roles are expected to grow by 11%.

IT Management Concentration: Leveraging the business basics taught in the Business Administration major, this program addresses the increasing reliance on technology among business professionals. Students will learn how to leverage technology solutions to solve complex business problems and improve operations. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, a career in the field of information technology management is projected to remain in high demand with 16% growth from 2021 - 2031.

Sports Management Concentration: This program is ideal for students interested in management and sports. They will learn the foundations of and graduate with a Business Administration degree while being introduced to the management and leadership techniques specifically needed to manage the business side of sports, from youth activities to amateur sports to collegiate and professional teams. The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that the employment of entertainment and sports occupations will grow 22% between 2021 - 2031.

Health Science Offerings Expand with New Programs



Six-Year Accelerated BS to DO

The accelerated six-year BS to DO program expands EC's relationship with Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine (LECOM)-Elmira. The program reduces the time students spend in college, saving them money and allowing them to start their careers more quickly. Also, students entering this program will not need to take the MCAT or complete additional graduate school applications, removing the application stress and allowing them to focus on their academic success.

"This exciting and unique program is another chance for us to build on our strategy to pair a liberal arts education with career-focused programs. Thanks to the relationship between EC and LECOM that began in 2019, we have found ways to create hands-on learning experiences that add value for the students at both institutions."

Students will complete their first two years at EC and be dual enrolled at EC and LECOM in their third year. Their final three years will be dedicated to earning their DO at LECOM. Unlike other accelerated programs, students in the EC-LECOM BS to DO program will meet all curriculum standards for both colleges, earning them both a BS in Biology from EC and the DO from LECOM.

"We are facing a critical shortage of physicians in the United States and especially here in Upstate New York," said Dr. Richard R. Terry, LECOM - Elmira Associate Dean of Academic Affairs. "This innovative program with Elmira College will impactfully expedite the production pipeline for future physicians and will go a long way to alleviating the disparity and limited access to health care in this region."

Post-Baccalaureate Clinical Lab Science

Designed for students with a bachelor of science (BS) in Biology, Chemistry, Biochemistry, or another health-related field interested in becoming a Clinical Lab Scientist (CLS). The program helps students gain a competitive advantage when applying to graduate programs and gives them the skills necessary to work in a laboratory setting.

"We are so excited to offer this new program!" exclaimed Dr. Elisabeth Paulson, Assistant Professor of Biology. "The field of clinical laboratory science is perfect for individuals with a strong interest in health and disease and who love working in

Students can easily tailor the Post-Baccalaureate CLS program and only choose the courses they need to supplement their BS. They do not need to retake courses.

This critical work is in demand, particularly in the greater Elmira region. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, job growth in this field will grow 7% between 2021 and 2031. However, entering this field requires admission to a highly competitive clinical laboratory training program.

A Campus-Led Approach to **Sustainability**

Faculty, staff, and students came together this past year to focus on sustainability and energy efficiency on campus.

In addition to the sustainbility and efficiency projects completed in 2022-2023, the Sustainability Leaders developed projects to help drive sustainability efforts.

Alexis Barnes '26, a Nursing major, organized a Move-Out Day Donation Drive at the end of the academic year to salvage clothing, furniture, and other small items that otherwise would have been thrown out as students packed up to leave campus. Barnes organized 20 donation sites around campus. Items collected were donated to The Salvation Army.

Ashton Craver '25, a Nursing Major, will implement his plan, a rain barrel at the Sustainability House, when he returns in August. While the Sustainability House provides an ideal location for the first barrel, Craver and the Sustainability Committee hope to approve more barrel placements and further reduce the College's water costs.

Grace Whiffen '24, an Environmental Science major, tracked energy use at the Sustainability House to get a baseline before testing



efficiencies, such as swapping in LED lighting and motion detectors. She hopes to illustrate that, while these types of measures can require initial investments, the long-term energy savings compensate for more costly equipment. Her next steps involve purchasing lights and motion detectors to measure the energy savings while determining the best options for campus use.

Fostering a **Diverse Campus Environment**

Elmira College is dedicated to fostering an environment where diversity is valued, equitable opportunities are ensured, and inclusivity is fostered. Helping Students Excel, In and Out of the Classroom

To assist in recruitment and retention efforts, Elmira College is enhancing its academic and career support. The Center for Academic and Professional Excellence (CAPE) is centralizing student support and initiating new programs such as networking apps like Handshake, a Career Closet, and a proactive pilot program called Supplemental Instruction (SI).

The SI program identified courses in which students often struggle but are required to take as part of a major. Faculty then nominated students who had previously taken the course and performed well to serve as Supplemental Instruction leaders. Each student received training, learning facilitation strategies, collaborative learning techniques, and learning strategies. They then sat through the courses, modeling in-class behaviors, serving as resources to students in class, and organizing weekly group study sessions.

"An average of 58% (Term I) and 68% (Term II) of all students enrolled in courses served with SI attended at least one weekly session, and 45% (Term I) and 60% (Term II) of that same group of students attended more than once," said the program's director, Michaela Johnson '17, Manager of Student Success and Assistant Director of the Center for Academic and Professional Excellence (CAPE). "This far exceeded our initial goal of 25% attendance in study sessions."

In the data collected about the program, one supplemental instruction leader said, "I am proud of the environment we have fostered because it is so welcoming and collaborative. This positive atmosphere offers students a unique opportunity to learn the material we have covered in lectures in a different way. Participants agree that Supplemental Instruction has given them a deeper understanding of the material because they get the opportunity to discuss the material with peers, which allows them to hear different perspectives of the material."







Elmira College students participated in the inaugural year of the 607 Soaring Southern Tier Startup Collegiate Competition, organized by IncubatorWorks and hosted by EC. Each team worked with a faculty advisor and an industry business professional to develop their pitches. Six EC teams and two SUNY Corning Community College (CCC) teams pitched their business ideas to a panel of judges, or "investors." The judges viewed a recorded presentation outlining each team's business plan and then asked the teams questions about their creative ideas and market research.

In the past academic year, she published 21 blog posts with tips for writing essays for medical school and five blog articles on topics related to Higher Education for Accepted.com.



Rebecca Rich, Associate Professor of Theatre and Director of Theatre, led a workshop during the 2023 National Congress of Acting Teachers hosted by The National Alliance of Acting Teachers. She taught the method she used to create an original play with EC students. Dr. Veronica Moorman, Associate Professor of Chemistry, presented, "Investigating Flavonoid Production and Grinding: Filling in Missing Data," at the December 2022 meeting of the Corning Section of the American Chemical Society.



Dr. Corey Stilts, Associate Professor of Chemistry, was the 2023 recipient of the Catharine McGraw Rock Award that is presented to a senior member of the Elmira College faculty.

Professional Programs

Dr. James Baer, Associate Professor of Communication Sciences and Director of Communication Sciences and Disorders, and EC student, Rianna Passino '23, a Speach and Hearing major, co-authored a book chapter about pure tone audiometric assessment and masking procedures for the eBook publication, "Clinical Audiology Concepts with SmartVS."

Dr. Deborah Owens, Associate Professor of Literacy Education, published a peer-reviewed article in the Reading in Virginia Journal, Volume XLIV, a journal of the Virginia State Literacy Association. The article, "Mentor Texts: Mirrors, Windows, and Models for Adolescent Literacy Learners," examines the use of mentor texts as models of excellent writing and as a means for students to explore their identities and social issues.

Dr. Stephanie Johnson, Director of Teacher Education and Assistant Professor of Inclusive Special Education, recently completed research that investigated the factors affecting teachers' ability to implement inclusive education in their classrooms. Her results are published in the "Journal of School Leadership," a Sage Publication.



The Nursing faculty were recognized for providing additional support to students preparing for the National Council, Licensure Examination (NCLEX). The Class of 2022 cohort had a 91.4% pass rate on their first exam attempt. According to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN), the national pass rate for U.S.-educated students taking the exam for the first time in 2022 was 79.9%.

Social & Behavioral Sciences

Dr. Jim Twombly, Professor of Political Science, published his fifth book, "Directing the Whirlwind: Deconstruction, Distrust, and the Future of American Democracy." It was co-authored with Dr. Lisa K. Parshall, Professor of Political Science at Daemen University in Amherst, New York.

Dr. Martha Easton, Associate Professor of Sociology, presented a plenary paper, "Assessing experiential learning," at the Midwest Sociological Society meetings in Minneapolis. Also, Easton, provided the keynote address, "The intersecting pressures in the Public and private spheres," at University of Texas at San Antonio art show, "We Are Overwhelmed."

Dr. Ping Zheng, Associate Professor of Psychology, was invited to write entries for the authoritative reference text, "The SAGE Encyclopedia of Mood and Anxiety Disorders," edited by Dara G. Friedman-Wheeler and Amy E. Wenzel

Dr. Christopher Terry, Associate Professor of Psychology, co-authored a paper published in "The Journal of American College Health," titled "Vaccine Hesitancy Among College Students and Individuals Seeking Healthcare: A Social Norms Perspective."

Shining On the Court and Off

Elmira College student-athletes perform well on and off the sports field. EC's close-knit community of coaches, faculty, and staff provide the support needed to help student-athletes succeed and meet the challenges and complexities of today's world.



Elmira College men's volleyball team member, Oscar Munoz Trinidad '23, was named the 2022-23 Empire 8 Co-Male Senior Scholar Athlete of the Year, based on a vote by the conference Faculty Athletic Representatives (FARs). The award honors male student-athletes who best exemplify what it means to be dedicated scholars and athletes over the course of their collegiate careers.

A native of Jarabacoa, Dominican Republic, Munoz Trinidad graduated in June 2023 with his bachelor's degree in Human Services and Sociology & Anthropology, while carrying a 3.9 cumulative grade-point average. He was a five-time member of the Empire 8 President's List for student-athletes with GPAs of 3.75. Beyond his good grades, Munoz Trinidad earned EC's Male Athlete of the Year award and Elmira's International Student of the Year Award in 2022. He then notched EC's Male Outstanding Career Achievement award in 2023.

On the court, Munoz Trinidad was a two-time United Volleyball Conference (Honorable Mention, Second Team) and Empire 8 All-Conference First Team selection. He wrapped up his Soaring Eagle career as one of the most decorated players in program history and led EC to an AVCA Division III National Top-15 ranking. He was named the Empire 8 Torchbearer Award Winner for Men's Volleyball Academic Excellence in 2023 and was named a College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic At-Large All-District selection. In 2023 the team had one of its finest seasons.

In addition, Munoz Trinidad served as a team captain for the men's volleyball program and was a volunteer assistant coach with the EC women's volleyball team in 2022.

"Oscar Munoz Trinidad is a very special individual," said Ryan McDonough '19, Head Coach for EC men's volleyball. "When Oscar first arrived at Elmira, he was very shy, spoke little English, but always approached every situation and adversity with a smile. Oscar was the driving force behind much of the success of the men's volleyball program and is an example of a perfect student-athlete."

Learning Beyond the Classroom Walls

When Judith Trask Smith '62 recalls her time at Elmira College she remembers her studies, but mostly she remembers EC as a chance to grow outside the classroom in experiences and friendships. "I received a good, well-rounded education, and had the opportunity to study abroad. The friends I made I still have today."

When Smith started at EC in the fall of 1958, she was a self-proclaimed quiet girl and "perhaps a bit shy." She appreciated EC for the opportunities it gave her, not only to receive a quality education but the learning beyond the classroom as well. Through clubs and activities, she gained friends and confidence. Smith participated in College Chorus, volunteered for a service organization called World Service University, and participated in class competitions.

"Several times a year there were competitions between classes, either musicals or plays. We were fortunate to have Kaye Feinberg Cummings in our class. She was able to write words to current music and was creative, along with the others, to create plays. Fumphets Forever was a lot of fun!"

In her junior year, Smith took a leap that would have been unthinkable before arriving at EC. A chance to study abroad became available and Smith decided to seize the opportunity.

With her family roots in England, she chose to study at the prominent University of Leicester in Leicester, United Kingdom. "There were about 1,200 co-ed students at Leicester, which was a big difference from 500 girls at Elmira!" Smith said. "The buildings were older and there wasn't a campus like Elmira. I moved into a dorm with single rooms about 1.5 miles from the University. I either walked, biked, or rode a bus [to classes] if the weather was bad."

In England, she grew both culturally and socially, gaining more independence. She strengthened her cross-cultural

communication skills and learned to be adaptable. Smith recalls the moment she realized how much older the country was than the US. "I remember walking on a Roman wall around the city of Chester and realizing that the wall and the buildings were older than any buildings in the US."

It was these beyond-the-classroom experiences and friendships that influenced her decision to include EC in her estate plans. "Travel is an opportunity to learn beyond the classroom walls. It's a chance to broaden your thinking. To see there are other ways of doing things," said Smith.

Smith's gift will help support students' education in and out of the classroom. It establishes a scholarship that provides critical funding to students who need it most. It also supports the Obler Summer Research Program, which gives students an opportunity to apply their classroom lessons and conduct research solutions for today's real-world problems. The program is funded with an endowed fund established through grants and personal gifts.

Today, Smith encourages other alumni to look back on their time at EC and the opportunities that allowed them to grow, both in and out of the classroom. "Find something that you're interested in and is important to you, and see how you can pay it forward."

Pratt Scholarships Provide for EC Students

Candice Terpolilli '23 grew up seeing Elmira College daily. She toured the grounds at Quarry Farm and the Mark Twain Study as a child. The rich history of the College excited her and drew her to it. So much so that when Terpolilli graduated from High School, she knew she wanted to make EC her place.

She also knew she wanted to become a nurse.

"My goal in life is simply to help people," she said. "My mom had numerous health issues and the nurses were amazing and made a bad day a little better. These nurses inspired me to want to become one!"

Terpolilli's dream was made possible with the support of the Alice Louise Pratt Memorial Scholarship, which is directed to provide financial aid to a student in EC's Nursing program.

In 2003, through the estate of Valentine B. Pratt, whose wife attended EC, two scholarships were created that provide support in perpetuity for future students.

The Alice Louise Pratt Memorial Scholarship honors Valentine Pratt's daughter, Alice Pratt, who became a registered nurse.



The Emma Louise Lathrop Pratt '34 Endowed Scholarship honors Valentine Pratt's wife, Emma Pratt, who held a special place in her heart for EC. She remained active with the Elmira Alumni Chapter throughout her life.

In the case of Terpolilli, it has meant fostering a committed community volunteer whose passion for giving back extends beyond nursing. She is a volunteer firefighter at West Elmira Fire Department, and recently earned certification to be a National EMT. Terpolilli also volunteers for Terps, which has a bus taking students to the local charter school, Finn Academy. She has built relationships with the students and hopes to inspire them to make EC their place.




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


FY 23-24 REVENUE BUDGET
